## Wantagh Museum Featured on News 12

"If you're looking to travel back in time, the Wantagh Museum has your ticket" exclaimed Danielle Campbell, a reporter for News 12 Long Island. She and photojournalist Brian Endres recently featured the Wantagh Museum in an episode for the series "Long Island's Hidden Past". Guided by WPS's Tom Watson, the TV segment highlighted the three structures of the Wantagh Museum; the 1912 LIRR parlor car that once escorted dignitaries across Long Island, a replica of the 1907 Wantagh post office and the 1885 Victorian Train Station, which hosts most of the historical artifacts on display.



Click or scan the QR code to view the episode of "Long Island's Hidden Past" that featured the Wantagh Museum The Hamlet of Wantagh was settled in the mid-1600s, and was first called Jerusalem. The train station was slated for demolition in the 1960s, giving birth to the Wantagh Preservation Society which led the effort to save the building.

The LIRR parlor car (aka "The Jamaica") had all the comforts of home including a dining

room, bedrooms, shower and a full-service kitchen with wood-burning stove. To keep passengers cool in the summer months, the parlor car featured an early version of air conditioning where fans swooshed air over blocks of ice.

Across from The Jamaica stands a replica of Wantagh's Original Post Office, a 10 x 12 foot structure built in 1907 that once stood on the corner of Wantagh and Railroad Avenues. (This location is now occupied by Mulcahy's.) At the time of its construction, Wantagh was a rural community populated mostly by farmers. Used until the mid 1920s, the Original Post Office was operated by one person, who sorted mail into slots.

The Wantagh station is typical of what many train stations on LI's South Shore were like in the 1800s. Stepping into the museum is truly like stepping back in time as you are surrounded by historical relics in an original 19th century building. The museum is open Sundays from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM, mid April through mid November. You are invited to experience these treasures first hand and see for yourself why Wantagh "has a place in the history books".

## Attention: Professional Photographers

The permit fee is only \$50 per hour (an additional fee of \$25 applies for access to the train observation deck). Your fees provide an important source of revenue for our Museum and helps us maintain its beauty that you depend on.

During your photo shoot, the museum grounds remain open to others and there can be no reservations of any particular area. However, residents that visit the museum have always been courteous.



Photography cannot take place before 10 AM or after dusk. Permits are rain or shine.

120 Years Ago - Summer of 1897: William Wilson, constable, completed an order for 10,000 white and light colored pigeon wings. He received another order for 25,000 gulls. Note: the birds were for millinery use as feathers were popular adornments on women's hats. Also in the news, several local residents purchased bicycles, the latest rage. A big yellow dog was annoying people on Park Avenue and his owner was urged to restrain him. Another dog attacked a Fleischman's yeast cake wagon, tearing a portion its curtain.

110 Years Ago - Summer of 1907: Beach parties were very popular. The Wantagh Mutual Association had a festivity at High Hill Beach. Including members and their families, the group of 200 strong enjoyed games, dancing and a fleet of boats.

85 Years Ago - Summer 1932: The Wantagh Spur Parkway opened to connect the Jones Beach Causeway to Southern State Parkway.

50 Years Ago - Summer of 1967: Wantagh Park Marina opened.
