Looking Back at Wantagh News

Travel back in time to get a glimpse at life in Wantagh, decades or more than a century ago!

130 Years Ago - January 1889: A new school house was being erected. The plans could be seen at Willet Whitmore's store. There was a call for a council to organize a Congregational Church.

120 Years Ago - January 1899: Justice Edgar Seaman took his oath of office. On New Year's Day, local resident Samuel Wilson gathered 150 pounds of good honey gathered from the rafters of his home where two swarms of bees had settled during the summer. Mrs. Ira Smith secured a judgement of \$500 against the Brooklyn Water Works for rental of her trout pond. A Wantagh Pigeon Shoot Club was organized with the initial shoot to be held on George Washington's birthday. Plans were underway to organize a baseball team made up of residents

of "this section" and Bellmore. Many residents reported seeing a ghost of a wild goose that departed this life 3 years before. It would generally appear east of the depot, give three honks and vanish.

110 Years Ago - February 1909: February brought two blizzards. During the second one, P. W. Behrens, the florist, had a number of fine plants frozen and about 50 panes of glass broken in his greenhouses. William DeMott, employed at the pumping station (Brooklyn Water Works) was snowed in and had to remain on duty for 48 hours with no food. The public school would not be open until the next week.

100 Years Ago - January 1919: The Jan 17th Dance given at the barracks at Lufberry Field was a great success and a large crowd attended. It was a farewell for the 35th Photo section. On Jan 31, the boys of Lufberry Field gave a genuine camp supper to the young ladies of the village. (Read more about Lufberry Field on page 3.) Everyone enjoyed the supper. Although it was a dreadfully stormy night, all the invited guests were on hand as the boys took them down from Fussell's store in Army trucks and after

supper, took them to the Parish House (Congregational Church) in the same manner, where they finished the evening with the Thursday night regular community dance. The chaperones were Mrs. J. J. Fussell and Mrs. Charles Schafer.

80 Years Ago - February 1939: The Wantagh PTA and Girl Scout Committee presented 3 one-act marionette shows in the Sunrise Park School.

Wantagh Military Air Base

Following the declaration of World War I, the US army constructed two small airfields on Long Island: Brindley Field located in Commack and Lufberry Field located in Wantagh. The moniker of the latter was in honor of aviation ace Raoul Lufberry who had flown in both the French and American air services.

Lufberry Field leaves its mark in the model plane fields at Cedar Creek Park, and in the name of Lufberry Avenue, which runs east and west between Wantagh Avenue near the High School, and the Seaford-Oyster Bay expressway.

During the war on 1918 May 19 while serving in France as a member of the Lafayette Escadrille, Raoul Lufberry was killed during a combat mission. His body is interned at the Lafayette Escadrille Memorial in France.

Lufberry Field was located south of the Merrick Road and east of the present Wantagh Parkway. Military personnel stationed at the field lived in barracks which were located north of the Merrick Road. Their consolidated mess hall was situated on the northeast corner of Wantagh Avenue and the Merrick Road.

During the war effort about 200 to 400 men were stationed at the Field. Being close to the shore, Lufberry Field had the advantage of using nearby waters as practice ranges with buoys marking off target areas. Understandably, these target areas were off limits to the local bay men denying them access to some prime oyster areas.

There were 12 Curtiss JN-4 airplanes assigned to the base. "The Jenny" as these airplanes were nicknamed, were affordable, easy to operate, and

versatile. More than ninety percent of American pilots trained during the First World War received their primary instruction on the Jenny.

The 12 Jennys were kept in four hangers at the Field. Four additional hangers were being constructed when the armistice was signed.







The evening also included presentations by local clergy and officials, capped off by the
