Wantagh Museum gets a new platform

The Wantagh Preservation Society is happy to report that the old and deteriorating platform that surrounded the museum building (aka Wantagh's original 1886 train station) has been completely rebuilt. The Society is grateful to the Nassau County Parks department for the new platform. Specifically the Society would like to thank former Nassau County Parks Commissioner, Eileen Krieb, for her tireless efforts to make this happen. The men from the Nassau County Carpenter shop did an outstanding job and always went the extra mile to make sure the new platform was built to the highest standards. During the construction of the platform the County also installed new electrical outlets around the platform, replaced the drainage pipes under the platform that diverted water runoff from the building's gutter system, and repaired the brick steps up to the platform. All the work was competed in time for the November 30th Winter Wonderland event that was sponsored by the Wantagh Chamber of Commerce.

Whether it be spring, summer, fall or winter, the grounds of the Wantagh Museum provide a scenic venue for professional photographers. However, a Photography Permit is required for all professional photographers that use the museum grounds.

The permit fee is only \$50 per hour (an additional fee of \$25 applies for access to the train observation deck). Your fees provide an important source of revenue for our Museum and helps us maintain its beauty that you depend on.

During your photo shoot, the museum grounds remain open to others and there can be no reservations of any particular area. However, residents that visit the museum have always been courteous.

Photography cannot take place before 10 AM or after dusk. Permits are rain or shine.

Landmarking update

The home of Col. John Jackson (1673 – 1743) has been granted New York State and National landmark designation. The home is located on the corner of Wantagh Avenue and Silverton Avenue.

New York Governor Hochel announced the landmark nomination of the house on December 10, 2021.

Col. Jackson was the grandson of Robert Jackson who settled in the Wantagh area in the 1640s. The home was built between 1690 and 1710.

The home was purchased by Beth Obergh a few years ago and she has done the heavy lifting of researching the history of the house and submitting the landmark application.

The picture of the house, below left, is circa 1900. Wantagh Avenue was just a dirt road. The picture, below right, is what the house looks like today.
