
APRIL MEETING

LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS, THE DAR

One of the more active historical organizations in the Wantagh area is the DAR, or *Daughters of the American Revolution*. The local group is the Jerusalem Chapter of a larger organization, the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. A prospective member must prepare a formal genealogy tracing her ancestry to a patriot of the American Revolution.

The group meets monthly, and its activities include cleanup of the Quaker Cemetery, placing historical signs around the community, and support of other worthy activities, such as the restoration of St. John of Jerusalem Church and the Old Wantagh Post Office. Originally there was a group of villages in mid-Long Island with Biblical names: Babylon, Bethpage, Jericho and Jerusalem, all settled by Quakers. The first three have survived, but Jerusalem has been swallowed up by Levittown. To commemorate local history, this DAR chapter chose the name Jerusalem in 1968 to honor the first settlers who came from New England to the Town of Hempstead in 1643 and then to Jerusalem in 1644.

This was the site chosen by Capt. John Seaman and Robert Jackson in 1644 because of the vast grazing area of the Hempstead Plains on the northern boundary and the extensive Meadowland and Great South Bay on the southern side.

Capt. Seaman was allotted the tract north of the present Jerusalem Avenue and some of this was continuously owned by his descendants until 1926. Robert Jackson was allowed the area south of Jerusalem Avenue. Both were active in the affairs of the Town of Hempstead and their descendants were patriots and soldiers in the American Revolution.

[Our] choice of name could be none other than Jerusalem to bring a reminder to the community of the local history from 1644 through even unto the present date.
