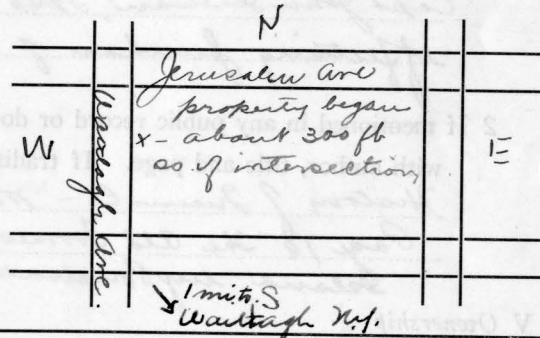
The Regents program of 1925 for the observance of the 150th anniversary of the American Revolution in New York included the marking of sites, buildings and roads of historic significance in the Colonial, Revolutionary and early State periods. Appropriations for that purpose were made and are still available for historic markers and monuments as a permanent part of the Sesquicentennial activities this year.

Your assistance is asked to complete a statewide survey of all unmarked historic sites, buildings, roads, bridges etc., by giving a full description of all the places of historic significance in your locality. It is an unusual opportunity to have your historic buildings and sites adequately marked. Please use a separate blank for each building, spot, bridge etc. Consult the oldest inhabitants and check up in the local records and histories so as to have the information as full and as accurate as possible.
